Phase 2 of the Sino-German Agricultural Centre (DCZ) commenced on the 1st of April 2018 and the new international team would like to introduce themselves in this first edition of this re-styled DCZ Newsletter.

We are thrilled to continue work on this important platform for German-Chinese cooperation on agriculture which has been established in the year 2015. In this second phase the implementing partners are IAK Agrar Consulting and the Leibniz Institute of Agricultural Development in Transition Economies (IAMO) on German side. As before, the DCZ is implemented together with two Chinese partners: The Foreign Economic Cooperation Center and the Chinese Academy of Agricultural Sciences (CAAS).

The DCZ Phase 2 will encompass four components

1. Agricultural Policy Dialogue with following topics
 - ◇ Environmentally-friendly sustainable livestock development
 - ◇ Cooperation in the seeds sector
 - ◇ Policy instruments for sustainable agricultural development


Combining these different tools of information distribution, we will give a public and visible face to the DCZ and hope that we meet your interests.

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Top DCZ events

May 31, 2018 DCZ Phase 2 , Launch Event held at German Em- bassy

Around 90 participants joined us for the Launch Event of the 2nd Phase of the DCZ. The partners and experts from various agencies, research institutes and companies were addressed by Mr. Friedrich Wacker, Deputy Director-General for International Cooperation & Global Food Policy in the German Federal Ministry of Food and Agriculture (BMEL), and Mr. Tang Shengyao, Deputy Director-General of the Department of Interna-

tional Cooperation in the Chinese Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Affairs (MARA). Both acknowledged the achievements made in phase 1 and expressed their expectations and

wishes for an even more vibrant and successful phase 2 of this unique co-operation platform that has been established by the two ministries in 2015.

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June 2-3, 2018 Sino-German Agribusiness Conference 2018 & 8th Chengdu Organic Agriculture Forum held in Pujiang County, Chengdu, Sichuan Province



The Sino-German Agribusiness Conference 2018 & 8th Chengdu Organic Agriculture Forum which was held in Pujiang County, Chengdu, Sichuan Province from 2 to 3 June 2018 and was the first major project activity in this phase of DCZ. The event was jointly organized by DCZ, FECC, Sichuan Provincial Agriculture Department, Chengdu Municipal Government and Pujiang County Government. All together about 400 participants, representing governmental officials, organic agriculture researchers, university professors, agricultural enterprises and cooperatives from China and Germany, attended the two-day event.

The opening session was chaired by Mr. Tang Zhishao, Foreign Economic Cooperation Center (FECC) and Chinese Managing Director of DCZ.

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Madame Yan Jing, Deputy Secretary General of Chengdu Municipal Government, Mrs. Ingrid Delfs, Administrative Consular of German General Consulate in Chengdu, Mr. Li Hongtao, Deputy Director General of FECC, Dr. Dietrich Guth, former Director General of International Cooperation Department, German Ministry of Food and Agriculture (BMEL) and Mr. Xiao Xiaoyu, Chief Economist of Sichuan Agriculture Department, delivered their welcome speeches.

The Keynote Speech Session on Green and Sustainable Agriculture was chaired by Dr. Jürgen Ritter, the German Managing Director of DCZ.

Dr. Ye Xingqing, Director General of Rural Economic Department of Development Research Center (DRC) of China's State Council, highlighted the importance of green development in Chinese rural revitalization and put forward policy recommendations for achieving green agricultural development in China. Prof. Dr. Harald von Witzke, President of Humboldt Forum for Food and Agriculture, reviewed the evolution of German agriculture in economic development and highlighted how the governmental policies and technical innovations impacted agricultural development. Other presentations by Prof. Deng Liangji, Sichuan Agricultural University and Dr. Lena Kuhn (IAMO) focused on the tasks for science to promote sustainable agriculture. Dr. Zhang Jibing, Deputy Director of the Organic Food Development Center

(OFDC) presented an impressive approach for digitalization of the organic food certification process.

The six presentations of the afternoon session focused on R&D and Innovation for Green and Sustainable Agriculture.

The Panel Discussion on Organic, Green and Sustainable Agriculture was chaired by Prof. Liu Yonggong of China Agricultural University and DCZ Advisor for the Agribusiness Dialogue. The panelists included Mr. Zhao Wubin, Deputy Governor of Pujiang County, Prof. Harald von Witzke, Mr. Reiner Carstens, Prof. Qi Yanbin from Sichuan Agricultural University, Prof. Yuan Donglai, Chief Scientist of Hezhong Holding and Mr. Yang Zhaoxin, Chairman of Sichuan Provincial Certification Association.



Another meeting was held in the evening of 2nd of June which served the purpose of strengthening the cooperation between enterprises and cooperatives.

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On 3rd of June, the Pujiang County Government invited the conference participants to visit The Center for Arable Land Conservation and Soil Management, Bosch and KUKA Manufacturing Companies located in Pujiang Sino-German Small and Medium Enterprise Cooperation Park, Pujiang New Industrial Park Planning Center, Joyvio Kiwi Plantation and Blueberry Production Base.



TianAn's CEO Madame Liu Yanfei accompanied us to visit the processing workshop and introduced the chain of vegetable production and marketing. TianAn has introduced a QR code-based traceability system programmed by SAP and an APP for smart phones to provide extension service to each of the 700 farmers under contract of the company.

May 14 – 17, 2018 Visiting program for Institute for Agricultural Production and Resource Economics, TU Munich

Between May 14 to 17 DCZ organized a visiting program for Professor Dr. Johannes Sauer and his assistant Stefan Wimmer from the Institute for Agricultural Production and Resource Economics, Technical University of Munich. Sauer and Wimmer were in Beijing to evaluate possible research cooperation in the field of agri-economics.

May 22, 2018 China Top Wine Beijing

Germany's most renowned wineries were represented at this year's *Top Wine China Fair* in the International Convention Centre on the Olympic grounds in northern Beijing.

The head of the exhibition stand of the German Wine Institute Manuela Liebchen reported of a booming market since 2017. Germany was able to increase its wine exports to China by 36% from 2016/2017 to about 22 million USD. China is a market with a future and high potential. However,

80% of Chinese wine drinkers prefer red wine!

May 24-25, 2018 International Symposium on Soil and Sustainable Development

Tanja Jaksch und Eva Sternfeld (DCZ) participated in the International Symposium, an event held in Beijing jointly organized by FAO, Global Soil Partnership, the Beijing Municipal Bureau of Agriculture and the Beijing Soil Fertilizer Extension Service Station. Several presentations by Chinese participants focused on issues related to black soil. Soil degradation and decreasing fertility of black soil in North Eastern China has in recent years become one of the major concerns. Prof. Ren Tucheng (China Agricultural University) showed impressive experiments to improve organic content of the soils by no till farming systems and crop rotation. Soil pollution was another issue that was widely discussed. According to Natalia Rodriguez Eugenio (soil Expert Consultant for FAO) in China, every year an estimated 12 million tons of grain are not suitable for consumption because of soil pollution.

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May 29-30, 2018 4th Field Day in the German-Chinese Arable and Agricultural Technology Demonstration Park Huanghai

On 29th and 30th May, the 4th Field Day of the German-Chinese Arable and Agricultural Engineering Demonstration Park (DCALDP) was held with participation of representatives from BMEL, MARA and GFA. For DCZ Tanja Jaksch participated in the event.

The DCALDP covers an area of 166 ha, which have been provided by the Chinese project partner Jiangsu Provincial Agricultural Reclamation and Development Corporation (SKIAD). 12 European partners are participating in this project. The 4th Field Day marked the last major activity of the first phase of the project for demonstration of modern sustainable farming techniques, modern agricultural machinery and adapted cultivation methods. It provided an opportunity to present the knowledge and experience gained over the three years, showcasing the cultivation and growth of crops and the practical use of state-of-the-art agricultural technology from Germany. SKIAD and the GFA as well as nine business partner companies signed the agreement to continue the project for another 12 months in a festive ceremony. The main objective is the exchange and development of a cooperation platform for crop production, agricultural technology and agricultural training with a view to the sustainable and green development of Chinese agriculture.

June 5, 2018 Lecture and presentation at China Food Business event in Shanghai

12 representatives of German export companies and 40 representatives of Chinese importers took part in the event sponsored by the German Federal Ministry of Food and Agriculture (BMEL) and hosted by the German Export Service GmbH and the GIC Greater China - Shanghai. In a workshop, information was provided on new customs and import regulations, primarily on the problems of certification of organic products and approval procedures, as well as on logistics procedures (DHL). At invitation of the organizers, Dr. Jaksch informed about the tasks and goals of the DCZ project. Later during an onsite inspection at Shanghai METRO and Citymarket stores, Dr. Jaksch explained how synergy effects can be used to improve product placement of products of German origin.

Good to know

China's total arable land falls for fourth year in 2017

According to a report of the Ministry of Natural Resources China's total arable land fell to 134.86 million ha in 2017, a decline by 60,900 ha compared to the previous year. Thus, narrowing the gap to the 120 million ha of arable land that according to the national policy are defined as red line for ensuring food security. [More](#)

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Organic Farming: New EU rules adopted

On May 22, new EU rules on organic farming and labelling of organic products have been adopted. The new rules are designed to cope with fast growing global organic food market. Production rules are simplified and harmonized. The control system will be strengthened along the entire supply chain. Producers from third countries will have to comply with the same rules as producers from EU countries.

China launches “emergency” campaign to boost soy output

Amidst the trade conflict with the US, China is undertaking efforts to increase domestic soybean production. According to Reuters a recent document by the provincial government of Heilongjiang, one of China’s major grain producing regions, calls for an extra 5 million Mu (333,333 ha) to be planted with soybeans in 2018. US-China Sorghum Fight Puts Dumping in the spotlight

The recent trade conflict between China and US, and China’s (later re-

voked) announcement to impose tariffs up to 178% on sorghum imports caused turmoil on the global grain markets. According to the US Institute for Agriculture & Trade Policy the announcement of such high tariffs did not come out of the blue but is based on an ongoing Chinese investigation into U.S. dumping of sorghum, that China in recent years has been importing as animal feed.

Publications and useful links

China’s Foreign Agriculture Investment by Elizabeth Gooch and Fred Gale, USDA Economic Information Bulletin, Number 192, April 2018

Chinese companies are increasing their investments in foreign agricultural ventures. According to the Chinese Ministry of Agriculture in 2016 over 1,300 Chinese companies had overseas investment of 26 billion US\$ in the field of agriculture, food processing, fisheries, seed and related fields. In this study Gooch and Gale show that Chinese investors so far tended to enter less-developed countries where there is potential for raising productivity by introducing Chinese technology. Only recently Chinese investors also shifted their interest to Europe and North America. In the headlines were ChemChina’s acquisition of Syngenta, a Swiss farm chemical and seed company and COFCO’s purchase of two major agricultural trading companies – Nobel Agri and Nidera. Pursuing sustainable productivity with millions of smallholder farmers. By Zhenling Cui, Zhang Fusuo et al. Nature, March 2018. Vol. 555, 363-366.

This report presents the results of 10 years long-term investigation of 1152 researchers and 20.9 million farmers of 452 counties involved. It shows that over the years farmers, who participated in the experiment have been able to increase yields on average by more than 10 percent and at the same time lowered use of nitrogen fertilizers by 15-18 percent. Researchers conducted more than 13,000 field trials testing the soil-crop system management program (ISSM), a model that helps to determine which crop variety, planting date density, fertilizer use and other strategies will work best. Tests were done with maize, rice and wheat. In later stage farmers of 452 counties were in involved. The impressive result showed, that there is room for massive improvement in sustainable and efficient farming.

Future looks bright for better pig welfare in China.

This report by Irene Camerlink, University of Veterinary Medicine, Vienna, Austria provides insights into recent efforts to improve farm animal welfare in China. In November 2017 the Chinese Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) has signed the first set of standards called 'China Animal Welfare Assessment General principles' for the principles and requirements of animal welfare evaluation. This year a first proposal for farm animal legislation at law level has been

submitted to the National People's Congress. [More](#)
